Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say there is no resurrection of the dead? If there is no resurreaction of the dead, then Christ has not been raised, and if Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation is in vain and your faith is in vain. But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead..." ( 1 Corinthians 15:12-14, 20)
lot lies in the balance when it comes to the resurrection of Jesus. Paul addressing the concerns of the Church at Corinth considers the vastness of the effect of an empty tomb. What difference did the resurrection make in the lives of those who hoped that Jesus was indeed the coming Messiah? Does it matter if we believe or not? Paul says it does!

We live in a world that denies the resurrection. More than most of the population of the world lives and behaves as if it never happened. There are those who teach resurrection as a myth; a story with no validation, a hoax mad up for the benefit of the disciples. As such, the reality of the resurrection is disregarded by the masses. But, what if it is true? What if the scriptures that share the experience of an empty tomb are true? How does it make a difference in our lives today?

Paul gives us the answer. If the resurrection is not true, we have been deceived. Our faith is invalid. We have believed a lie. Life just goes on with no purpose or meaning. Then with th confidence gained through experience, he proclaims: Jesus is "in fact been raised from the dead."
But his words of affirmation are just a smaller part of his life. Paul, a persecutor of the early Christian movement (the Way) experiences the reality of a risen Lord on the road to Da mascus. (see Acts 9) And from that moment, Paul dedicates his life to telling everyone that the resurrection gives life purpose. Ultimately he is killed for his faith. The very proof that he understood the reality and validity of an empty tomb.

What about you and me? Do we believe in the empty tomb? Do we hold fast to Jesus, risen and alive? Does the resurrection help direct our lives daily in the living out of our faith? can tell you that I affirm each of these queries. I have lived and will continue to live the truth a Scripture. I con con inced in fact has been raised from the dead..."

I truly hope you do too!
